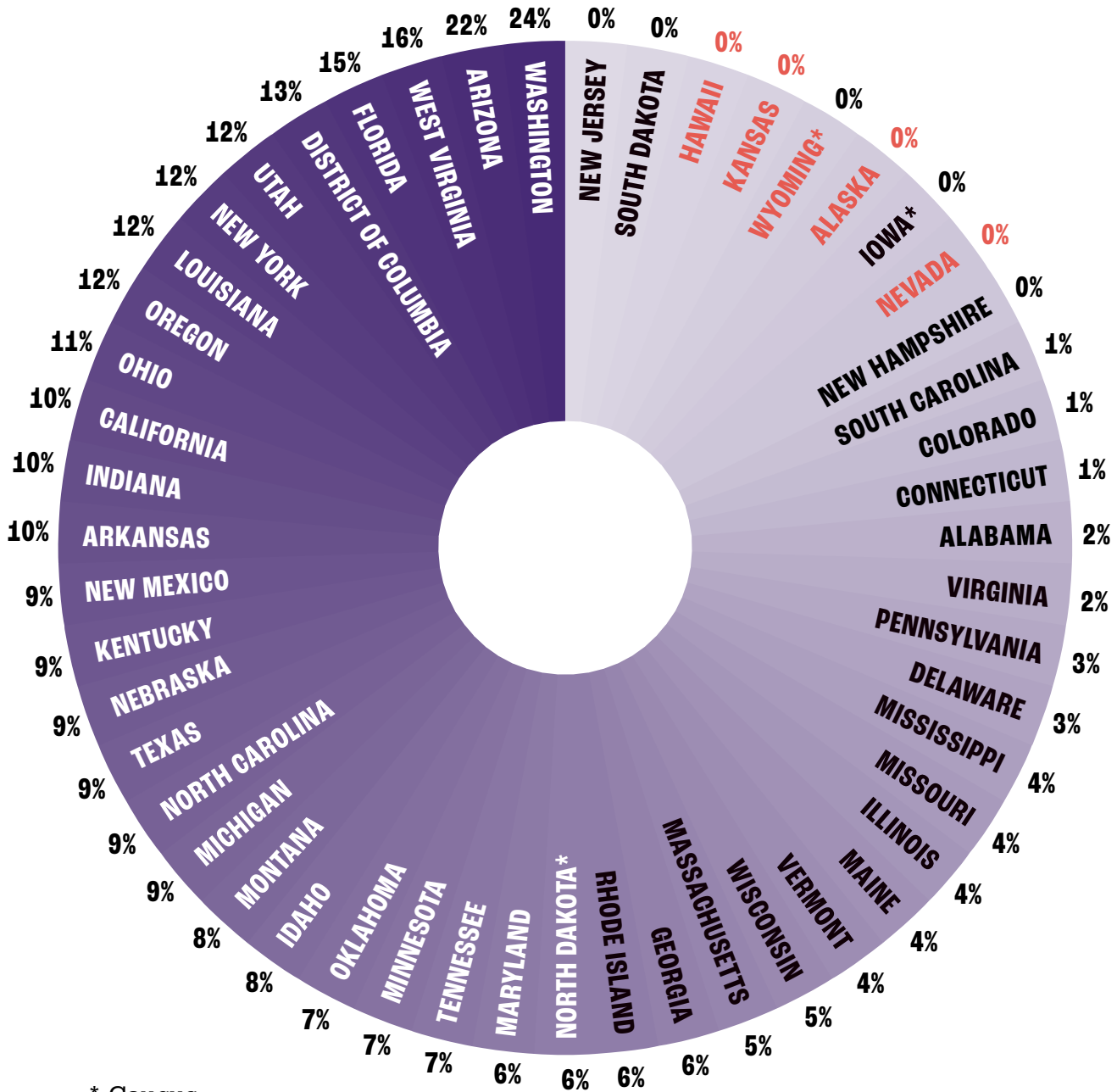


2020 DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY

HOW MANY VOTES WERE WASTED IN YOUR STATE?

Millions of voters cast a “wasted vote” for president every election cycle. Wasted votes happen when a voter casts a ballot for a candidate who already dropped out of the race. It is common in states which vote immediately after a major candidate withdraws, and among early voters.

3 million Democrats cast “wasted votes” in 2020! How does your state stack up?

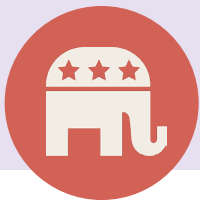


* Caucus



Five states — Nevada, Kansas, Alaska, Hawaii, and Wyoming — used ranked choice voting for their 2020 Democratic presidential primaries and made every vote count. Ranked choice voting gives voters the option to rank candidates in order of preference. If a voter’s first choice candidate is inactive, the ballot counts for the voter’s backup choice.





2016 AND 2024 REPUBLICAN PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARIES

HOW MANY VOTES WERE WASTED IN YOUR STATE?

Wasted votes are a major problem in presidential primaries. Wasted votes happen when a voter casts a ballot for a candidate who drops out before primary day.

Ranked choice voting is a better way to vote in presidential primaries. It gives voters the option to rank candidates in order of preference. If a voter's first-choice candidate drops out, their ballot counts for a backup choice.

Over 700,000 Republican primary voters cast “wasted votes” in 2016. In a less competitive and shorter contest, **over 300,000 Republican primary voters cast “wasted votes” in 2024.** See which states had the most wasted votes in 2016 and 2024:
